Here's the latest on what's going on in Kingsbury!

September!

This week is the first full week in the month of September!

September is the ninth month of the year, the third of four months to have a length of 30 days, and the fourth of five months to have a length of less than 31 days. In the Northern Hemisphere September is the seasonal equivalent of March in the Southern Hemisphere.

September (from Latin *septem*, "seven") was originally the seventh of ten months on the oldest known Roman calendar, with March (Latin *Martius*) the first month of the year until perhaps as late as 153 BC. After the calendar reform that added January and February to the beginning of the year, September became the ninth month, but retained its name. It had 29 days until the Julian reform, which added a day.



Meteor showers that occur in September include:



Aurigids - August 28 - September 5 ~~ Peak: September 1

Epsilon Perseids - September 5-21 ~~ Peak: September 9

Daytime Sextantids - September 9 - October 9 ~~ Peak: September 27

Southern Taurids - September 10 - November 20 ~~ Peak: None. They just ramble on with no sharp peak.



Get ready for fall! The Autumnal Equinox falls on September 23, 2023 at 1:49 a.m. our time. At this time, there are approximately equal hours of daylight and darkness.

September, in **Old England**, was called *Haervest-monath* (Harvest Month). This is the time to gather up the rest of the harvest and prepare for the winter months.



There are flowers enough in the summertime,

September's birth flowers are the aster and the morning glory.



The aster signifies powerful love, and the China aster expresses variety or afterthought in the language of flowers.



The morning glory symbolizes affection. It can also mean coquetry, affectation, or bonds in the language of flowers.

The September birthstone is the sapphire, which was once thought to guard against evil and poisoning.



Sapphire is a form of corundum that is typically blue, a color caused by tiny bits of iron and titanium; the vivid, medium blues are more valuable than lighter or darker forms. Due to various trace elements, sapphires also appear in other colors. Those with red colors are called rubies.

Sapphires were thought to encourage divine wisdom and protection. They symbolized purity, truth, trust, and loyalty. Some believed that if they were placed in a jar with a snake, the snake would die.

The sapphire, along with the related ruby, are the second-hardest natural gemstones, with only the diamond being harder.

Labor Day

This Monday, September 4th, is Labor Day!

Labor Day in the United States is a public holiday celebrated on the first Monday in September. It honors the American labor movement and the contributions that workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of the country. It is the Monday of the long weekend known as Labor Day Weekend and it is considered the unofficial end of summer.

Beginning in the late 19th century, as the trade union and labor movements grew, trade unionists proposed that a day be set aside to celebrate labor. "Labor Day" was promoted by the Central Labor Union and the Knights of Labor, which organized the first parade in New York City. In 1887, Oregon was the first state of the United States to make it an official public holiday. By the time it became an official federal holiday in 1894, thirty U.S. states officially celebrated Labor Day.

Canada's Labour Day is also celebrated on the first Monday of September. More than 80 countries celebrate International Workers' Day on May 1 – the ancient European holiday of May Day – and several countries have chosen their own dates for Labour Day.






Kingsbury City Limits

Kingsbury News Past



The one of the earliest Kingsbury mail carriers, Mr. Albert Wolfshohl, kept a diary and much of it pertained to his job delivering mail.

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .

This is an early history of our post office taken from those diaries.

HISTORY OF THE

THE KINGSBURY, TEXAS POST OFFICE

The first Post Office in Kingsbury was opened on August 13, 1875 with Mark A. Izard as Postmaster.

Herman Schmidt was appointed seventh Postmaster in September 1897. The nearest Post Offices to Kingsbury was Wade, Texas, seven miles to the North and Acona, TX eight miles to the South.

On July 1, 1904, Kingsbury got a petition for R.F.D. carriers. Jim Flowers was appointed first carrier on R.F.D. #1. On July 11th sold 6 mail boxes. On the 12th he sold 8 more. Some of the customers has put up wooden boxes.

Albert Wolfshohl was made carrier on Route 1 on July 15,1904. Mr. Jim Flowers had been appointed temporary carrier to get the route started. Mr. Wolfshohl bought a horse for \$15.00 for the mail cart. While he was on the route he bought grapes and peaches for 15¢ a bushel. On August 19th he sold the first money order for \$6.00.

John M. Mapp was appointed carrier for Route 2 to begin on November 1, 1994. John Cash was appointed Substitute for Mapp.

In 1908 Albert Wofshohl made his first trip as a carrier using a covered mail cart.

On February 3, 1910 the Kingsbury Post Office was robbed of \$382.00 worth of stamps and money. A young loafer was arrested at Sullivan, Texas by W. M. Appling. He had \$14.00 in stamps and \$25.00 cash in his pockets. Inspector Clark found \$300.00 and \$25.00 in stamps that the fellow had hidden.

The Rural Carriers Association of Guadalupe was organized on Feb. 12, 1910, in Seguin at the Post Office. Officers were Mrs. Moeller, President; Albert Wolfshohl, Vice-President; Will Sellinger, Secretary and Mr. Burger, Treasurer.

In 1904 the salary for a rural carrier was raised to \$83.33 a month.

In November, 1911 the Post Office was moved from the Lynch building to the old Schmidt building.

Jan. 1, 1913, Parcel Post was started. Post Office was moved to the J. A. Lynch building.

Sept. 1913, Alvin Fricke and Van Beaty made rural carriers for the Kingsbury Post Office.

The Guadalupe County Commissions Court has instituted an outdoor burn ban for Guadalupe County. The burn ban imposed by the Commissioners Court has specific guidelines for



Welding, cutting, and grinding or any activity that causes a spark



Burning household trash



Burning of other items

The official notification with all the guidelines can be found on the Guadalupe County website here.



The City of Kingsbury has a "trigger" ordinance where a burn ban is in effect in the city limits whenever there is a burn ban issued by the county.






Of the 254 counties in Texas, there are currently 213 that have a burn ban, up from 198 two weeks ago. This leaves only 41 counties still without a burn ban in the state.

Current burn bans by county in Texas two weeks ago and this week:






Kingsbury Weather





The first car radio is made by Motorola

The Broadway Melody becomes the first major musical film of the sound era.

The soft Drink 7-up is invented by Charles Leiper Grigg.

Grace Kelly, Audrey Hepburn, and Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy were all born in 1929.

Calvin Coolidge was President until Herbert Hoover took over in March.

And the Dow reached a peak of 381.17 on September 3rd prior to the slide and eventual wall street crash in October.
